Prout School – (south of Winnipeg Beach 1916 – new school 1933, closed 1967

Mapleton School District NO. 5

 Was formed by the Protestant Section of the Board of Education on July 3, 1871.

 Children from the East side crossed the river by boat, ferry or on foot in the winter until Gonor, Donald and Kitchener School Districts

were formed early in 1900

A new Mapleton School was built in 1912.

Today, Mapleton School is a vibrant part of Lord Selkirk School Division.

Miss Davis' School 1858

- Opened in 1858 at a site about a mile south of Lower Fort Garry and called "Oakfield".
- Matilda Davis, daughter of the officer in charge of York Factory, opened the school for forty boarders.
- Miss Davis taught French and Mrs. Kennedy instructed in Music.
- In 1873 Miss Davis died and Mrs. Cowley finished the term. The school was then moved to St. Andrews parsonage.
- Bishop Machray made it a diocesan institution and it is now Balmoral Hall.

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

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
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Mapleton School district – 1871 – 1967 in the Village of Old England

- Children from both sides of the river attended Mapleton School
- 1898 Children from East side had to take the ferry and often fell overboard due to crowding
- St Clements & St Andrews shared the cost of the ferry
- 1900 school division was split and Gonor, Kitchener and Donald School districts were formed







St Andrews School District No. 2

- In 1829 Archdeacon Cockrane, his wife and William Garriok started teaching children and women in their home (School #1) The children learned agriculture practices as well as the 3 "R".
- November 27th 1831 a day school (School #2) was opened in a log building with a sod roof. The building had been erected near the north east of the the adjacent church.
- The school master was W.R. Smith and the teachers were Mrs. Cockrane and Donald Gunn.
- February 14th 1832, six wheels for spinning flax were delivered and the school became the first technical school in the West.
- In 1827, renovations were made to the building

St Andrews School District No.2

- In 1851, a larger structure (School #3) built of stone, logs and hand hewn shingles was built on the present school site.
- In 1900 this school was condemned and used a parish hall until 1926 when it was repaired and converted back to a school.
- 1935 two rooms were added and in 1947 it was sold to a local farmer.
- 1900 when the previous school was condemned, School #4 was built and an addition was built in 1907. It burnt down in the summer of 1926 and unfortunately most of the school records were lost in the fire.
- 1927 a new school (School #5) was built and it is still part of the current school building. A two room addition was built in 1942 and in 1955 and 1962 classrooms were built in the basement

St Andrews School District No. 2

- June 1964 the construction of the current school (School #6) began that incorporated the 1927 structure. It was a ten room school building that included a large auditorium.
- In recent years, a new kindergarten section has been added to the south side.
- St Andrews School changed from a mission school to the Central School District of St Andrews No.2 in 1870, the year Manitoba became a Province.
- In 1964, the Rossdale School district # 956 was added to the Consolidated School District of St Andrews
- Today, St Andrews is a K-6 school within the Lord Selkirk School Division
